NORTH CAROLINA COUNCIL OF GOVERNORS MEETING MINUTES MULTIPLE DISTRICT – 31

SATURDAY, MAY 6, 2017, 9:AM MARRIOTT AIRPORT, GREENSBORO, NC

The North Carolina Lions MD-31 Council of Governors met Saturday, May 6, 2017, at the Marriott Airport Hotel in Greensboro, NC. Governors attending were: Max Bumgardner, Butch Conrad, Laraine Dupree, Irwin Siegelwax and Barbara Beltran. Council Chair Tim Williams presided.

Chairman Williams called the meeting to order. Governor Siegelwax led the Pledge to the American Flag and Governor Conrad offered the Invocation.

Chairman Williams welcomed those Lions and guests attending and recognized the International Family, inviting them to make comments.

PIP Sid Scruggs congratulated the Governors on a successful convention and asked that State Convention attendance be encouraged. He announced that then Immediate Past International President Bob Corlew will be the speaker next year. He provided information from the LCI Board, including about the new Global Service Team

PID Harvey Whitley echoed the sentiments about a successful convention, including excellent entertainment. He noted that five new clubs have been chartered and that South Carolina and Florida are also in the positive column. He said new clubs are essential to membership growth. He said this is the last year of the 3-year appointments for the Global Leadership and Membership Coordinators.

PID Lacey Presnell complimented the Governors for their efforts.

District Governor Reports followed.

District 31-L Governor Bumgardner said his district is up 18 members and the district is looking for another bus to transport VIP's to the coast in October.

District 31-I Governor Conrad said his district has added 96 new Lions, but has lost 126. He said 31 clubs have inducted at least one new member this year.

District 31-O Governor Dupree reported that she is working to organize a new club at Raeford.

She said district membership is down 27 members at this time.

District 31-N Governor Siegelwax reported new Lions, Campus and Leo clubs. He said 1,036 persons were helped by a \$26,109.11 LCIF Grant following Hurricane Matthew.

PDG Dave Butler was appointed Parliamentarian.

Upon motion of Governor Laraine, second by Governor Siegelwax, the vote was unanimous to approve the agenda.

PDG Rhett White, Secretary/Treasurer, presented the Financial Report through April 30, 2017.

He noted that revenues are up due to membership growth in the first half of the year. **Upon motion of Governor Beltran, second by Governor Bumgardner, the motion was unanimous to accept the Financial Report.**attachment # 8

PDGs Paulette and Larry Gasperson reported on arrangements for the Centennial Youth Exchange Camp. They noted eight international youth will participate in activities across the state. Upon motion of Governor Dupree with second by Governor Conrad, the vote was unanimous to transfer \$6,384.62 from reserves to the Gaspersons for the Youth Exchange Camp.

PDG Ron Beltran said an accurate report on the 94th NC Lions State Convention had not been compiled since the Conventions was held last weekend. He said a thorough report will be made at the August Council meeting.

He said the advances from the Council were used to support meals and that ad sales fell \$10,000 short. He said golf registrations were refunded due to heavy rainfall. Recommend changes include guaranteeing fewer rooms because the Convention is losing money with penalties and reduced attendance. He asked if district meetings are needed during the convention and urged the next Council to consider these and other problems.

PDG Ron Staley presented two resolutions for consideration. They were in memorial of PDG Roland Heath and in appreciation to DGE Stephen McLaurin for assisting with transportation and providing banners used at conventions. **Upon motion of Governor Siegelwax, second by Governor Dupree, the vote to adopt the resolutions was unanimous.**attachments # 10 & 11

PDG Gary Steele reported on the calendar fundraising project of the 2017-2018 Council of Governors. He asked for photographs and urged Lions present to purchase a calendar, then asked for a \$4,000 advance to support the project. **Upon motion of Governor Beltran, second by Governor Siegelwax, the advance was unanimously approved.**

North Carolina Lions, Inc., President Charles Holleman, reported on Camp Dogwood improvements and the Brighter Visions and Camp Dogwood ticket sale projects. He asked Governors to get their Brighter Visions and Camp Dogwood Chairs to contact their clubs. He reminded Lions of the Frank Brooks Waterfront Dedication and that the camp's 50th Anniversary will take place in July with all Lions invited all to attend.

He announced the NCLI Budget Caucus and General Membership Meeting.

Following a break, Committee reports were presented.

PDG Chris Headley presented the Boys and Girls Home Report for Lion Judy Headley who was absent. He said the Lions cottage needs \$26,900 in furnishings.

Lion Liz Steele reported on Campus and Leo clubs, stating there are 35 Alpha Clubs and that 40 youth attended the Leo State Convention. She said one Leo will attend the Lions International Convention.

Celebrate Liberty Chair, Michael Schwartz, was not present and no report was given.

PDG Dale Dupree, Constitution and By-Laws Chair, reported no action but asked all Lions to review the Constitution and By-Laws for changes that should be made.

There was no report from the Diabetes Awareness Chair, Jan Holleman.

Lion Judy Jackson, Diabetes Awareness/DAPS Chair, reviewed the weekend with International 2nd Vice President Gudrun at the Kinston Industries for the Blind learning about peer support. She noted that next year Diabetes Awareness will be added to the LCI service area and offered to travel to help clubs set up DAPS groups.

Lion Tom Snively reported on guide dogs, urging zone Chairs to use zone meetings for programs on Leader Dogs. He said there are 18 guide dog schools in the United States and Canada with 16 active Leader Dogs in North Carolina with the cost at about \$48,000 per dog including VIP training.

PDG John Owens presented the Leadership report, announcing that the Lions Leadership Institute was a success with 29 participants and that the DGEs and 1st VDGs have completed their training.

There was no Membership Report due to PDG Vince Schimmoller being in Pamlico County to help organize a new Lions Club..

Historian, PDG Ron Beltran, said he is looking into State Convention histories . attachment # 16

DGE George Culp, thanked the Lions for allowing him to serve as Information and Technology

Chair for the past four years. attachment # 17

PDG Diane Whitley reported that 11,695 children have been screened with SPOT and OPTICS technology. She said there were 1,506 referred for further action.

VDG Susie Dailey, Lions Services for Children, reported on 40 club programs this year with food and reading action as focus areas. She said LCI provides a long list of service activities for children.

PDG Carlton Weeks was absent but his LCIF report was read by Chairman Williams and submitted in writing.

PDG Carlton Metts reported on the election results and reminded Lions of the offices and fall deadlines for expressing interest in a post.

Promotions Chair, PDG Allen Reinhardt, reminded those attending that the Promotions Committee will meet at 1:PM and will discuss the International Convention.

Lion Harriett Walton, State Convention Chair, supported the call for a task force to look at state Conventions, She suggested that membership from the next three Councils should be included. She said challenges are ahead. She noted that PDG Herb Justice assembled a notebook with time line and other useful information in hosting a convention.

She announced that the 2018 State Convention will be in Greensboro and that Lions from District 31-O are considering a bid for the 2019 Convention.

PDG Gwen White, Centennial Chair, reported that MD-31 has been awarded a \$7,500 Centennial Grant for legacy projects in each district. The districts will match their \$1,500 with \$300 in local funds. She urged the districts to move forward with these projects.

Upon motion Governor Beltran, second by Governor Siegelwax, the Council unanimously authorized a new budget line (# 421) to distribute the Centennial Project funds.

Upon motion of Governor Conrad with second by Governor Dupree, the vote was unanimous to accept the Reports as presented.

Council Vice-Chair Laraine Dupree presented plaques to Council Chair Tim Williams and Council Secretary/Treasurer Rhett White on behalf of the Council, thanking them for their efforts during the year.

Chairman Williams asked Governor Conrad to adjourn the meeting with the Benediction. He then declared the meeting adjourned.

When we used to live in the Cincinnati area, we would listen to the Cincinnati Reds broadcasts with announcers Marty Brennaman and Joe Nuxhall. At the end of the post-game show, Joe, a former Reds pitcher, would always use his signature line saying "we're rounding third and heading for home." Well, that's about where we are in this Lions year. However, as Lee Corso so often says on College Game Day—"not so fast, my friend." Yes, not so fast because we still have work to complete—work that will definitely carry over into next year. I thought that as we approach year end, a brief review of the year might be in order. So, how have we done in District L? We have accomplished a few things and are still working on some others.

So, what are some of our plusses? First, we were able to get the first bus for the VIPs in the western portion of the District to go to the VIP Fishing Tournament; we were able to build 2 new clubs---the first since 2010---our most recent, the West Asheville Centennial Club will have its Charter Night on May 11th, and we are really excited about this club. Why---their mantra is "We are not your Grandfather's Lions Club." The club is 65% female---it has good diversity as members come from the African-American community, the Mexican-American community, the Indian-American community, and the Asian-American community---maybe this is how we need our clubs to look---very representative of the communities they serve. But more importantly to me is the average age of the members is 41; we are still in the process of working on a Campus Club at Western Carolina University and we have potential interest at Lenoir-Rhyne University and Mars Hill University; we are still plus on membership, but without the new clubs, that would not be the case; we increased our female membership in the Districtnot as much as we would have liked, but we are over 36%; our clubs have an increased social media presence thanks to 2nd VDG Alan Lake's idea of a Facebook Challenge contest; we had our first District Day of Service; we were able to introduce the Hope Chest for Women to clubs around the District and gained some additional volunteers for them as well as provide our members with another service opportunity; we held a special Brighter Visions fund raising concert---we didn't make as much as we wanted but we still were able to add a nice chunk of change to our Brighter Visions number; and we have helped raise funds for the Pisgah High School Band that will be leading the North Carolina delegation in Chicago.

So, where are our opportunities? We are at a plus 18 on membership because of the new clubs as I just mentioned. Curtis and Alan were very involved in these efforts and recognize the value that new clubs bring. I would like to specifically mention Alan here--he works the night shift at the Meritor plant in Fletcher. He would get cleaned up and meet us at 9 am as we started making our calls most every day of our club building exercise—even the one on Morganton. I guess you find out just how much an individual values an organization in these types of efforts. We have to keep building new clubs, or we will see sharp declines in our membership. Curtis has already identified the areas

for new clubs for next year. It appears that we may lose 2 clubs at the end of this year--Lake Junaluska and Robbinsville. These were 2 clubs that have been hanging on for a several years. They were not interested in getting new members nor were they very visible in their communities---two bad signs that we are seeing in some other clubs. We have 47% of our clubs in the District that are less than 15 members, with mostly older members. Not all of those clubs are in decline, some are very strong. However, it has been a few years since most of these clubs have inducted a new member----the interest iust does not seem to be there as they are satisfied with who they are. That being the case, those clubs will continue to decline in membership. Just this year alone, 20% of the members that we have lost were due to death--which, for me, is an alarming number. That will most likely accelerate over the next few years. All of that to say that we must continue to develop new clubs to remain relevant as a District. If you were at the State Convention for the Necrology Service on Sunday morning, you know that my fellow Governors have some of the same issues/concerns. We have struggled again with Brighter Visions contributions. Some clubs just don't participate, regardless of how much you try to engage them. Others, because of the increased number of requests for local assistance received over the last 2-3 years, will give but not at the requested level. If membership declines, that participation will decline also. So far, we have had 34% of our clubs that have not participated in Brighter Visions, and most of those have not participated in several years—and yes, you guessed it, most of those are the clubs that haven't added new members. 27% have given at the asked level per member. On Camp Dogwood ticket sales, we are at 56% participation from the clubs in the District. We have got to find ways to improve on that or find a different method of raising these funds that engages the clubs more. I know that Curtis has some ideas for next year on some different ways to do that.

So, we have made strides toward reversing the trend in recent years in the District—to Change the Game, a bit. However, we have to keep at it. I have confidence that Curtis will continue to make positive moves for District L next year.



STATE COUNCIL REPORT SATURDAY, MAY 6, 2012 GREENSBORO

In July District 31-I started with 59 clubs and 1327 members. We have added 96 members this year but regretfully have lost 126 members for a net loss for the year of 30 members. Thankfully we have only lost 1 member this month! We lost one club early on in the year - Cornelius-Lake Norman. Our average size club is 22 members but 31 clubs have inducted at least one member or more this year. With barely two months left in this Lions year we are hopeful! District 31-I is still trying to start a new Club in Clemmons in Forsyth County. Believe it or not we have not given up. We are still in contact with our LCI Consultant, Paul Baker, and he has suggested various options available to us. One interested member from Clemmons actually emailed me and wanted to get things rolling on a new club. We have been tied up with planning for the State Convention in Raleigh and working with our own planning committee for our convention in November. We refuse to throw in the towel. Pray for us! We have had a request for a Campus Club at UNC Charlotte but our consultant has suggested that we wait until the beginning of school in August. So, I'm leaving that to DGE George Culp and have told him that I would certainly help, if needed. Wouldn't want George to have nothing to do. I am proud to say that club elections have been held and that 46 of the 58 clubs have turned in their PU101 but of course the deadline is May 15 so hopefully those 12 clubs that have not turned theirs in will have by that time.

As of April 28 District 31-I has turned in \$112,543 to Brighter Visions with a goal of \$220,000. As you are well aware most clubs have major Brighter Visions fundraisers in May and June so we are hoping to meet or exceed this goal. District 31-I has turned in \$19,309 in Camp Dogwood tickets and 11 clubs have met the 3 books per member or more or 1.47 books per member.

District 31-I is pleased to have awarded the State Peace Poster winner, Mahalia Stainback of Concord Middle School and sponsored by the Concord Lions Club.

We are also honored to have inducted two spouses of former Past International Presidents, Jennie Woolard and Jennie Stickley into the Hall of Fame of the North Carolina Lions and privileged to have had two Past International Presidents from District 31-I. Of course we are equally proud of Past International President Sid Scruggs and his lovely wife Judy who was also inducted into the NC Hall of Fame at our State Convention. One has no control over where one is born!

District 31-I has completed our Legacy Project. The project is visual aids and dedicated space for blind and visually impaired in Alleghany County and surrounding communities by means of the Alleghany Public Library. 1st VDG

Elect Carolyn Sprinkle was instrumental in spearheading this Legacy Project. The library expansion has been an ongoing project of the Sparta/Alleghany community for more than 20 years and is a literary, economic, educational and employment enhancing asset for this area. The Alleghany County Public Library underwent a facility expansion that was completed mid-December 2016. Alleghany County is an economically distressed, Tier 1 county located in the northwest mountains of North Carolina and Bob and Carolyn Sprinkle live there.

The library is located on the campus of Alleghany Elementary, Middle and High Schools and is housed with the Alleghany Campus of Wilkes Community College, NC Works and the Blue Ridge Business Development Center and this includes small business and entrepreneurial training, education and technology support.

A plaque will be displayed in the Alleghany County Library recognizing the Lions of MD-31 and District 31-I.

In November 2016, the Sparta Lions Club members donated \$4000 to the library and designated the funds be used to provide visual aids and designated space for use of this equipment by the blind and visually impaired in Alleghany county and the contiguous counties of Ashe, Surry and Wilkes counties in North Carolina as well as Grayson County, VA.

Currently a local support group of blind and/or visually impaired individuals meet once a month at the Alleghany county Library. The availability of expanded and dedicated space and visual aids will provide for them the opportunity to expand their support group and use of visual aids not available to them anywhere else in the area. The success of this program will be the growth of community involvement and recognition of our special needs of our friends and neighbors and allows for a place, technological and other aids to assist them in living their lives to the fullest.

Funds were available from MD-31 and District 31-I from administrative funds budgeted and not used and also from Lions Clubs member donations. Naturally District 31-I is proud to provide these services to individuals in need.

Finally, all clubs in District 31-I have been visited. DGE George Culp has a jump-start on next year and is ready to hit the ground running on July 1. His emphasis will be on service and membership. I have enjoyed my tenure as the District Governor of District 31-I and wish to thank the members of the District for their hard work especially my Zone and Region Chairs and the DG Team. Being the District Governor is by no means a one-person show. It takes team work and my team has done exceedingly well. Thanks to all involved and to the PDG's that I probably pestered continually for advice.

I am confident that DGE George will carry on the tradition of the "Ideal" District.

The Lions of District 31-O continue to serve in their communities. 13 clubs have reported service in the 4 areas of the Centennial Service Challenge with 5 more reporting service in 3 areas.

14 Lions participated in the recruitment process in Raeford. 19 new Lions joined the Raeford-Hoke Centennial Lions Club. We should be signing up the 20th member in the next week. 4 Lions have completed the on-line training to become certified guiding Lions; 2 of these will be assigned to the Raeford-Hoke Club.

District O has 2 new Leo Clubs: The Southern Middle School Leo Club sponsored by the Aberdeen Lions Club and The Wingate University Omegà Leo Club sponsored by the Wingate Lions Club.

8 clubs in the district have positive membership growth this year.

Our membership currently stands at -27; but that does not include our new club.

We stand at 62.95% our Brighter Visions goal having donated \$88,754.28. 74% of clubs have participated. 15 clubs have matched or exceeded their donation of last year. Donations will increase as many clubs are holding major fundraisers during May and June.

9 clubs have sold 3 books of Camp Dogwood Raffle tickets per member. The district's average is 1.45 books per member with 65% of our clubs participating to date.

Our district GLT is scheduling officer training in 3 various locations on 3 different dates to make training more accessible.

This has been a good year for District 31-O. We still have time to make this a great year.

I welcome the incoming leadership team, DGE Karl Ernst, 1st VDGE Susie Dailey, and 2nd VDGE Paul Silverman and wish them a successful year of growth and service.

Membership is progressing. We are proud to announce the chartering of our new Wake Southwest Centennial Lions Club (in the Holly Springs area)! They chartered originally with 24 members, and have already added more new members. Welcome to our new Lions there! This is in addition to the Ahoskie Centennial Lions Club chartered earlier this Lions Year. Also this year, we have reinstated 2 of our formerly cancelled clubs.

We are proud to announce that Wake Forest Lions Club has been awarded a Centennial Grant by LCI, to construct benches in the Wake Forest area.

I have enjoyed making Governor visits to over 40 clubs, and others have been visited by DGE, Stephen McLaurin, or 1st VDGE, Nathan Medlin.

We held a Cabinet Meeting on Sunday, April 30th, at the State Convention.

North Carolina Council of Governors Meeting Minutes, Multiple District 31

9:AM, Saturday, February 4, 2017 North Raleigh Hilton, Raleigh, NC

The North Carolina MD-31 Council of Governors met Saturday, February 4, 2017, 9:AM at the North Raleigh Hilton, Raleigh, NC. Governors attending were: Max Bumgardner, Butch Conrad, Laraine Dupree, Irwin Siegelwax and Barbara Beltran. Council Chair Tim Williams presided and Council Secretary Treasurer Rhett White participated.

(For the record, a Council work session was held on Friday evening, February 3, 2017, 7:30 PM, at the North Raleigh Hilton)

Chairman Williams called the meeting to order and asked Governor Siegelwax to lead the Pledge to the United States Flag. Governor Conrad followed with the Invocation.

Chairman Williams welcomed the Lions and guests that were in attendance. He then recognized the Lions International Family and offered an opportunity for them to make remarks.

PIP Sid Scruggs said North Carolina will have its largest International Convention delegation in years, but he urged Lions to not forget the State Convention and the International Officer who will be a guest in North Carolina. He emphasized membership by recruiting and building clubs, noting that the United States now has only 22% of the worldwide Lions while India has 23%.

PID Harvey Whitley complimented the Governors on good district conventions. He also thanked the Governors for their new club efforts, encouraging the 1st VDGs to start organizing their new clubs at this time. He reported that North Carolina is -36 members as of January 31st, but that Districts L and S are positive due to new clubs that have been organized. He reported that North Carolina is +81 in women's membership and urged Lions to take advantage of the Veteran's Membership Program.

Governor Conrad said District 31-I has added 73 members while losing 103 members including one club. He said new club development is underway.

The host committee was asked to work with Lion Judy Jackson, DAPS Chair, to organize the walk that will probably be held at the Governor Morehead School for the Blind.

Under New Business, Lion Steve Walker, retiring Executive Director of the NC Lions, Inc., asked the Council to authorize transfer of \$ 604.00 to NCLI for Brighter Visions. He explained the funds were additional Lions History Book sales after earlier sales had been transferred. Upon motion of Governor Dupree and second by Governor Beltran, the vote to transfer the funds was unanimous.

PDG Charles Holleman, President of NCLI, reported on activities at Camp Dogwood and changes at NCLI. He introduced Hillary Brodofsky, new Executive Director of NCLI. Lion Liz Steele, Chair of Campus Clubs/Leo Clubs reported there are 34 Alpha Clubs and one Omega Club. She said North Carolina does not have a Campus Club but work is underway at UNC-Pembroke. She announced the State Leo Convention at Camp Dogwood, February 24-26, thanking the Governors for contributing \$580.00 per district for the Leo Stop Hunger project.

PDG Michael Schwartz, Celebrate Liberty Chair, reported that two essays were submitted for judging. He said there will not be a Celebrate Liberty pin this year.

PDG Dale Dupree reported there are no proposed changes to the Constitution or By-laws.

Lion Jan Holleman, Diabetes Education Chair was absent and no report was given.

She said the Walk-A-Mile in their Shoes event at the State Convention would take place from noon to 2:PM at the Governor Morehead School. 

May 5, 2017

From the perspective of history, everything is relative. I am in the process of assembling a comparative history of recent state conventions with an overview of activities, attendance and costs. This may help future councils to compare bids, and make determinations as to how to structure their conventions.

I have spent a short time talking with Virginia Woolard, and after hearing some conversations with 2nd International Vice President Gudrun Yngvadattir relative to her influence on whether or not Gudrun should join Lions, believe that those thoughts should be included in articles relative to the influence of women on Lionism. NCCOG Report Final Report as Chair

As the NC Lions State Information Technology Chair for the last four years, I would like to express my gratitude for allowing me to serve in this position. The ability to provide technology and information could not be made possible without the excellent team of District Webmasters who are innovative, technically focused, and foremost, Lions who care.

As I leave my post, the transition to your next chair is underway. PDG David Shimburg has graciously agreed to serve in this capacity. Lion David is a member of the Charlotte Southpark Lions and is Zone Chair for Zone 10 31I. Lion Dave has been a Lion since 1978 and retired in December 2015 from CIT Group, where he served as the Disaster Recovery Manager for the Information Technology Division

Lion Dave and I are scheduling a committee meeting prior to the end of this Lions year to discuss the transition and expectations. Each individual district is maintaining their district website and sharing updates when necessary. This will continue. Now it is time to look to the future and how NC Lions can provide technology to our VIPs.

Just recently, Lion Peter Crumley, a member of the Beaufort Lions and a retired Physical Scientist whose blindness was first diagnosed in 1988. presented us several documents. One document entitled: Technology to Aid the Visually Impaired to Achieve an Independent Lifestyle in the 21st Century. In the article he challenges us with: "A change in prioritizing the types of assistance provided to the visually impaired and blind communities must occur to properly address the changing needs of those who are members of these communities which Lions have historically assisted. A gap exists between the low-vision, severely visually impaired and blind communities as to the diversity of products provided by the Lions to assist those transitioning through the defined visual communities from useful sight to blindness.' He continues with reminding us that it is time to move forward with mobile technology and provide training in its uses.

Peter hopes through this effort, fellow Lions will obtain knowledge of current technologies available to the Blind so all Lions may gain the ability to properly guide our Blind clients when they are considering future technology options. His documents are a means for passing forward some of the knowledge that Peter has gained while making the journey down the path to the world of darkness a little easier for those who are destined to follow by enlightening them to some of the amazing tools now available to the Blind.

With this information in hand, I am recommending that Lion Peter become a member of the IT Committee.

My thanks to the four Council of Governors that have supported the efforts of this committee. As the new 2017-2018 Council is installed, I am certain that this committee has the ability to take our organization into the 21st Century as we continue our goals of serving others.

KidSight Committee Report

All Districts have had a great year. Some have completed screenings for this Lions' year. Others are still screening. Both Spot and Plusoptix screeners are in use.

Screenings have been held at day cares, preschools, libraries, churches, health fairs, community mission centers and, of course, in schools.

Ages of children screened range from six (6) months to thirteen (13) years.

I haven't received data from all clubs within each district, but data I do have indicates that 11,695 students have been screened with 1,596 referrals, a rate of 13.6%.

I didn't receive data on the number of volunteers and hours worked except for one district: eighteen (18) volunteers worked seven hundred eighty-three (783) hours.

All districts are concerned about the follow-up; HIPA prevents access to data and schools say they don't have time. One district is considering paying a school nurse a couple of hours per month to follow-up and collect the data. Only three requests have been made to Lions for assistance.

Districts continue to plan school screenings. Many plan to branch out of the school system and move into the private preschools and daycares. This is a growing project.

MD-31 LCI CENTENNIAL COORDINATOR Saturday, May 6, 2017

MD-31, North Carolina Lions, has been awarded a Lions Clubs International Centennial Grant in the amount of \$7,500. This means that each district will receive \$1,500 to put toward a district Centennial Project that will when completed represent the state's Centennial effort. Each district will be required to match the grant with at least \$300 (20%) in cash.

Each district has an approved project under the umbrella of a State-wide project.

The grant funds have been deposited with the State Council Treasurer, as required by Lions Clubs International. Districts should provide copies of invoices indicating how the full \$1,500 per district (plus \$300 match) has been spent and that the project has been completed (detailed financial accounting).

Please use your District Centennial Coordinators to help facilitate a successful project.

A final report is required. It should include a short narrative describing the project, the number of Lions or volunteers that participated in work on the project and the anticipated number of individuals that will be served during the first 12-months of the project (results and impact of the project). Provide three photos of the project including one that pictures the plaque or other recognition as a "Lions Clubs Centennial Project." Include copies of newspaper or other publicity and media coverage, including positive comments from the user public or local officials (detailed evaluation of the project).

The report must be signed by the District Governor (2016-17).

Thanks to the District Centennial Chairs for their efforts to spread the news about our 100th Anniversary Celebration. I urge the incoming District Governors to include Centennial Training in your District Officer Training sessions. Our clubs need to know how to receive credit for their Centennial efforts.
